

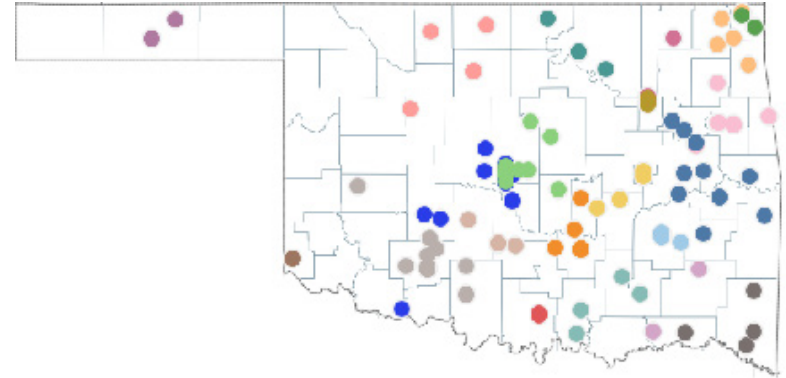

What are CHCs?

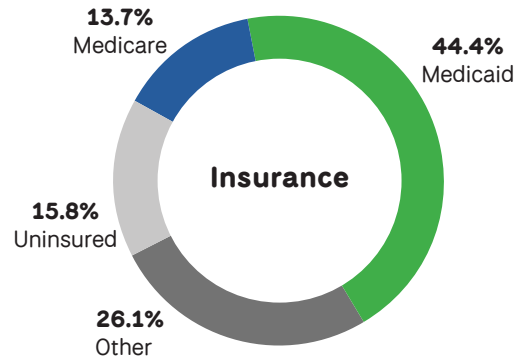
Community health centers (CHCs), also known as Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) or health centers, are nonprofit health care providers that deliver comprehensive primary health care services to medically underserved communities including families and individuals in rural areas, low income populations, the uninsured, people with limited English proficiency, and all patients regardless of ability to pay. CHCs offer a host of services like dental, optometry, vision, behavioral health, and substance use disorder services.

CHCs use sliding fee scales based on patients' income, have after-hours coverage, meet extensive performance and accountability requirements, and are governed by patient-majority boards.

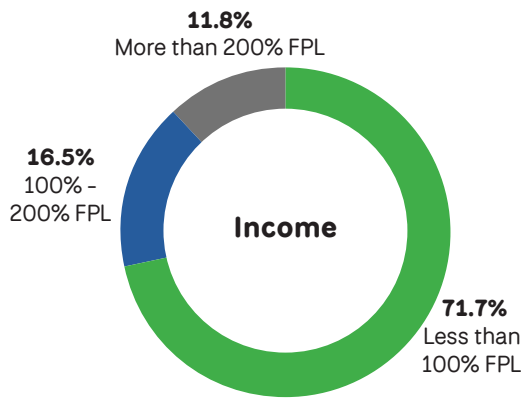
CHCs provide integrated primary health care where there is a low ratio of primary care physicians to people. Studies show community health centers save the health system money by providing preventive and primary care services. Many health centers provide dental, behavioral, transportation, case management, and other cost-efficient services to best serve the patients in their communities.



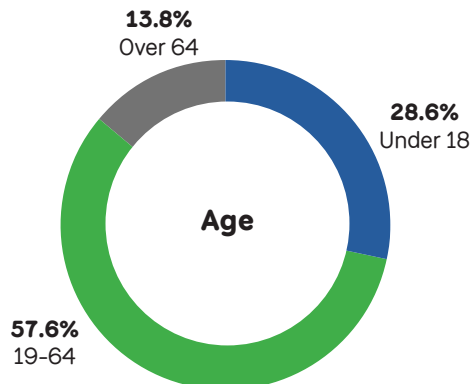
OKLAHOMA COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS PATIENT PROFILE



Most health center patients are either uninsured or have Medicaid. CHCs provide high quality services to everyone - including Oklahomans with and without coverage.



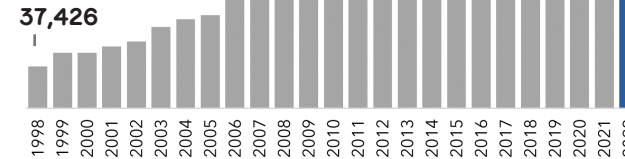
Most health center patients are either at or below the federal poverty level (FPL). CHCs are located in underserved areas across the state.
